Krótką biografią Williama Butlera Yeats'a

Wypis z książki „MAŁY SŁOWNIK PISARZY ANGIELSKICH I AMERYKAŃSKICH”

YEATS William Butler, 13 VI 1865 Sandymount k. Dublina - 28 I 1939 Roquebrune (Francja), irlandzki poeta i dramaturg. Wybitny przywódca literackiego ruchu odrodzenia narodowego w Irlandii (*Celtic Renaissance*)

Dzieciństwo i młodość spędził w Irlandii i Londynie. Ulegając wpływom ojca, drobnego właściciela ziemskiego o artystycznych skłonnościach, studiował jakiś czas w szkole sztuk pięknych w Dublinie, jednak główną sferą jego zainteresowań i działalności miała stać się literatura. Pierwsze wiersze drukował w 1885, próbując jednocześnie sił jako dziennikarz i krytyk literacki.

Faktami o zasadniczym znaczeniu, zarówno dla biografii, jak i twórczości Y., była jego znajomość z patriotką irlandzką Maud Gonne, oraz związanie się z grupą irlandzkich intelektualistów, dążących do odrodzenia narodowych tradycji. Celem tej grupy, do której należeli m. in. Synge, Moore G., Gregory Lady, było wzmocnienie świadomości narodowej i ożywienie życia umysłowego Irlandii. Celowi temu służyć miała m. in. utworzona z ich inicjatywy scena narodowa w Dublinie, tzw. Abbey Theatre, otwarty w 1904.

Twórczość dramatyczna Y. przez długi czas związana była z tym właśnie teatrem, którego był współzałożycielem. Uczucie poety dla Maud Gonne, które trwać miało niemal przez całe jego życie, było inspiracją wielu jego wierszy i przez pewien czas działalności narodowo-wyzwoleniecznej, choć w zasadzie Y. pozostawał na uboczu wydarzeń politycznych i powstania irlandzkiego 1916.

Rok 1923 przyniósł poecie nagrodę Nobla, a wraz z nią wzrost wpływów i prestiżu. Po utworzeniu niepodległego państwa irlandzkiego Y. był kilka lat senatorem. W ciągu całego życia Y. często podróżował (Włochy, Hiszpania, Szwajcaria, Francja, Stany Zjednoczone), wygłaszał odczyty w wielu krajach i do końca biorąc żywy udział w życiu publicznym.

Twórczość poetycką rozpoczął wcześnie, publikując pierwsze wiersze w „Dublin University Review” i in.

czasopismach irlandzkich. Pierwsze tomy poezji, *The Wandering of Oisin* (1889, Wędrówki Osjana) i *Poems* (1995), obejmują wiersze oparte na irlandzkich motywach ludowych i legendach celtyckich, przeznaczone dla prostego czytelnika, nieskomplikowane w formie i treści. W kolejnym tomie *The Wind in the Reeds* (1899, Wiatr w trzcinach) Y. odszedł od swych pierwotnych założeń, wprowadzając do pełnej liryzmu poezji złożoną symbolikę, bogatą metaforę i elementy wizjonerskie. Ten styl zachował w kolejnych zbiorach: *The Green Helmet and other Poems* (1910, Zielony hełm i inne wiersze), z którego znaczna część wierszy poświęcona jest Maud Gonne, *The Wild Swans at Coole* (1919, Dzikie łabędzie w Coole), *The Tower* (1928, Wieża), *The Winding Stair* (1933, Kręte schody), *New Poems* (1938, Nowe wiersze).

Centralne tematy poezji Y. to przeciwstawienie młodości wiekowi dojrzałemu, celów duchowych – materialnym, przemijaniu ludzkiej egzystencji – wiecznemu trwaniu dzieł sztuki. Motywy te, rozwijane i komentowane w licznych wierszach, oparte są na wypracowanej przez Y. „teorii przeciwnieństw”, która wraz z koncepcją „masek”, wedle której poeta poprzez swe utwory prezentuje się pod różnymi postaciami, realizując w ten sposób nieosiągalne w życiu dążenia, stanowią teoretyczne podstawy jego poezji. Należy tu jeszcze wspomnieć o skłonnościach Y. do mistycyzmu, o jego zainteresowaniach magią i spirytyzmem, które znalazły szerokie odbicie w jego twórczości i w osobliwy sposób ukształtowały jego poglądy filozoficzne i metafizyczne, zawarte w książce *A Vision* (1925, Wizja).

Doskonałość artystyczna późnych wierszy Y., jak *Bizancjum* (*Byzantium*), *Odjazd do Bizancjum* (*Sailing to Byzantium*), *Among the School Children* (*Wśród dzieci szkolnych*), ma swoje źródło w nieco gorzkim stoicyzmie autora w obliczu nadchodzącej starości, w zaakceptowaniu rzeczywistości, która przyniosła mu rozstanie z Maud Gonne i w niespełnieniu młodzieńczych nadziei politycznych, gdyż nowo utworzone państwo odbiegało wielce od jego marzeń o wolnej Irlandii. W nadchodzącej starości widzi Y. okres, który w zamian za utraconą „muzyką zmysłów” (*sensual music*) przynosi mądrość, dojrzałość i umiejętność cieszenia się pięknem dzieł sztuki. Bizancjum jest dla Y. symbolem doskonałości sztuki, a zarazem harmonijnego połączenia różnych sfer działalności człowieka.

Twórczość dramatyczna Y., obejmująca sztuki wierszem i prozą, związana była początkowo z Irish Literary Theatre (Irlandzkim Teatrem Literackim), którego był założycielem, a później, od 1904, ze słynnym Abbey Theatre. Sztuki pochodzące z pierwszego okresu jego twórczości, *The Land of Heart's Desire* (1894, Upragniona kraina), *The Countess Cathleen* (1899, Księżniczka Kasia), *Shadowy Waters* (1900, Cieniste wody), *The King's Threshold* (1903, Królewski próg), *Cathleen ni Houlihan* (1902, Cathleen, córka Houlihana), *The Pot of Broth*

(1902, Garnek rosółu), *Deidre* (1906), nasycone fantastyką, oparte są w większości na starych irlandzkich legendach i podaniach ludowych, a wzbogacone o aktualne akcenty pełne patriotycznej treści. Powtarza się np. motyw Starej Ubogiej Kobiety, będącej symbolem Irlandii, dla której młodzi chłopcy porzucają swe narzeczone i poświęcają życie.

W *The King's Threshold* Y. wykorzystuje treść starej legendy dla ukazania roli poezji i sytuacji poety w społeczeństwie. W późniejszych sztukach potęgują się elementy symbolizmu, zmniejszając ich komunikatywność i oddalając je od pierwotnych postulatów, jakie spełniały dramaty z pierwszego okresu twórczości, które, wskrzeszając tradycje narodowe i barwny świat mitologii irlandzkiej, miały być xarazem sztukami o ludzie irlandzkim, ukazywanym w całym jego folklorystycznym bogactwie obyczajów, wierzeń i legend.

W 1916 – 1917, pod wpływem zainteresowań teatrem japońskim, Y. pisze *The Four Plays for Dancers* (Cztery sztuki dla tancerzy), dramat oparty na epizodach z heroicznych podań o Cuchulainie, gdzie wprowadza maski i posługuje się skomplikowaną symboliką. Z późnych sztuk Y. szczególnymi walorami artystycznymi odznaczają się *The Words Upon the Window Pane* (1934, słowa na szybie) i *Purgatory* (1938, Czyściec).

Obok poezji i dramatów pisał Y. opowieści oparte na irlandzkich podaniach gminnych, m. in. *The Secret Rose* (1897, i *Stories of Red Hanrahan* (1904, Opowiadania o Hanrahanie Rudym) oraz szkice o charakterze autobiograficznym, zebrane w tomach, jak *The Celtic Twilight* (1893, Półmrok celtycki), *The Trembling of the Veil* (1922, Drżenie zasłony), *The Autobiography of W. B. Yeats* (1938, Autobiografia W.B Yeatsa).

Wybitny pisarz regionalny i piewca nacjonalizmu, nie posługiwał się jednak Y. dialektem anglo-irlandzkim, pisząc swoje utwory pięknym i obrazowym, angielskim językiem literackim.

Wiersze Y. tłumaczyli na język polski m. in. J. Leszcza, Cz. Miłosz, Z. Ławrynowicz, opowiadania – J. Birkenmajer i Z. Przesmycki, *Księżniczkę Kasię* – J Kasprowicz.

William Butler Yeats – biografia

(Wstęp Wandy Krajewskiej do Poezji wybranych, PIW 1987)

Yeats urodził się w 1865 roku w Sandymount, na przedmieściu Dublina. Przodkowie jego ojca byli Anglikami. Osiedlili się w Irlandii w XVIII wieku i już drugie pokolenie tego rodu włączyło się w irlandzki ruch narodowy. Małżeństwa z Irlandkami wzmacniły więź z przybraną ojczyną. Yeatsowie należeli do protestanckiego odłamu ludności. Pradziad poety był pastorem w Drumcliff, w hrabstwie Sligo, gdzie Yeats kazał się pochować.

Poeta z zamiłowaniem zagłębiał się w swoje drzewa genealogiczne, wytrwale poszukując w nim arystokratów, jakkolwiek pierwsi Yeatsowie, którzy przybyli na zieloną wyspę trudnili się handlem. Poszukiwania te niewiele dały rezultatów, doprowadziły jednak Yeatsa do przekonania, że ród jego spokrewniony jest z Heleną trojańską, a nazwisko wuja Pollexfena to zniekształcona forma imienia jej brata Polluksa.

Dzieciństwo Yeatsa upłynęło częściowo w Irlandii, częściowo w Londynie, dokąd rodzice przenieśli się po raz pierwszy w 1868 roku, by ojciec jego mógł odbyć studia malarskie. W 1880 roku znów powrócili do Dublina. Po skończeniu tam szkoły średniej Yeats zpisał się do Metropolitalnej Szkoły Sztuk Pięknych. Wystąpił z niej przed skończeniem studiów przekonawszy się, że nie odziedziczył po ojcu zdolności artystycznych. John Yeats, malarz, kontynuator prerafaelizmu i gorący wyznawca tego stylu, wpajał w dzieci umiłowanie sztuki. Dbał o utrzymanie atmosfery prerafaelickiej w domu. W londyńskim mieszkaniu były tapety Morrisowskie. Tak więc młodość Yeatsa ukształtowały dwa środowiska: Irlandia i londyńska awangarda artystyczna. Bliższa mu była zawsze Irlandia. Tęsknił do niej, gdy mieszkał w Anglii, i z radością do niej wracał. Były to lata, gdy rozwijał się ruch narodowy, okres, który nazwano "renesansem". W 1885 roku, po dwudziestu latach więzienia, powrócił do Dublina przywódca nacjonalistów, John O'Leary, i podjął na nowo swą działalność. Wierzył, jak większość ówczesnych patriotów, w nierozerwalny związek literatury z polityką. Ale literatura ta była bardzo uboga, trzeba ją było dopiero stworzyć. Miały pomóc w tym badania folklorystyczne, dzięki którym rozpowszechniały się podania i pieśni irlandzkie. Do nich sięgali debiutujący pisarze irlandzcy. W Yeatsie, który w latach osiemdziesiątych zaczął ogłaszać swe pierwsze utwory, dojrzał O'Leary wielki talent, który mógł oddać znaczne usługi "sprawie".

Yeats nie prowadził badań naukowych nad folklorem. Wolał notować podania i pieśni, które przynosiła mu matka z odwiedzin u rybaków. Nie układał ich systematycznie. Zapamiętywał te, które najsienniejszym przemawiały do jego wyobraźni.

Poznał również Yeats innych działaczy i literatów z kręgu Johna O'Leary — Douglasa Hyde'a, Katherine Tynan.

Obok organizacji politycznych i kulturalnych powstawały wówczas w Irlandii, jak i w całej Europie, liczne stowarzyszenia i bractwa okultystyczne. Zetknął się z nimi najpierw w Dublinie, potem w Londynie, gdzie poznał Helenę Bławatską i stał się członkiem Towarzystwa Teozoficznego. Przez pewien czas należał do bractwa różnokrzyżowców. McGregor Mathers, mistrz wiedzy ezoterycznej, nauczył go systemu symboli kabalistycznych, które poeta wprowadzał potem często do swej poezji.

Z tych trzech źródeł - irlandzkiej tradycji ludowej, okultyzmu i sztuki prerafaelickiej - czerpał Yeats obficie w całej swej twórczości. Pierwsze jego wiersze wydrukował "Dublin University Review". Były wśród nich liryki, poemat dramatyczny i artykuł o irlandzkim działaczu i poecie Fergusonie - trzy formy literackie, jakie miał uprawiać przez całe życie. W 1889 roku ukazał się w Irlandii i Anglii pierwszy zbiór jego poezji, *The Wandering of Oisin and Other Poems* (Wędrówki Oisina i inne wiersze).

W 1887 roku Yeats przeniósł się znów z rodzicami do Londynu. Wchodził w jego środowisko literackie, poznawał wybitnych pisarzy, jak Wilde czy William Morris. Szukał przede wszystkim znajomości z Irlandczykami mieszkającymi w Anglii. Wygłaszał odczyty o swym kraju w Irlandzkim Klubie Literackim, który w 1892 roku przekształcił się w Irlandzkie Towarzystwo Literackie. Miał ono szerzyć znajomość literatury irlandzkiej w Anglii i zachęcać młodych pisarzy do tworzenia literatury narodowej. Yeats projektował nawet wydawanie specjalnej serii Nowej Biblioteki Irlandzkiej, która drukowałaby debiuty Irlandczyków. Inicjatywa ta nie przyniosła wprawdzie wielkich rezultatów, niemniej działalność poety zwróciła uwagę na jego kraj.

W 1891 roku Yeats wraz z Ernestem Rhysem, inżynierem, który porzucił swój zawód, by zająć się literaturą, i T. W. Rollestonem, mało jeszcze wtedy znanym pisarzem, założyli The Rhymers' Club, Klub Rymopisów. Członkowie jego wierzyli w wartość sztuki i pragnęli ją odrodzić. Było wśród nich sporo dobrze się zapowiadających poetów, których zniszczyło pijaństwo, jak popularnego wśród awangardy Ernesta Dowsona. Jeden tylko Yeats wyróżnił się wśród nich jako wybitny pisarz i on jeden nie uległ dekadencjom nastrojom. Chociaż wkrótce się przekonał, że dyskusje w gospodzie Cheshire na Fleet Street, gdzie się spotykali nie wnoszą nic nowego, wspominał je po latach z wdzięcznością. To członkowie Klubu Rymopisów pierwsi w Anglii próbowali wprowadzić nowe formy wiersza buntując się przeciw wiktoriańskim konwencjom, to ich kontakty z literatami francuskimi zwróciły uwagę Yeatsa na symbolizm. Poznał osobiście Verlaine'a i Mallarmego, ale poezję ich czytał w przekładach Arthura Symensa. W Anglii nie było symbolizmu, jedynie twórczość Yeatsa z przełomu wieku najbardziej zbliża się do tego kierunku. Nie jest to jednak naśladownictwo francuskiej awangardy.

Wydany w 1893 roku zbiór Róża samym już tytułem wskazuje na różnice. Róża nie jest symbolem

osobistym, jakie występovaly w poezji francuskiej, lecz narodowym, jakkolwiek nie pozbawiona jest i własnych znaczeń dla poety. Imię Róża nosiły w Irlandii dziewczęta o czarnych włosach. Powszechnie utożsamiano kwiat ten z pięknem. Różokrzyżowcom kojarzył się z cierpieniem. Z cierpienia miało się zrodzić piękno i pokój w Irlandii. Inne konotacje pochodzą z ksiąg okultystycznych, z magii, z angielskiej literatury romantycznej, z Blake'a i Shelleya. W następnym tomie wierszy, Wiatr pośród trzcin (1899), symbole stają się jeszcze bardziej złożone, ale niemal zawsze łączą się z Irlandią i dla Irlandczyków są zrozumiałe. Dowodem tego uznanie zbioru za najlepszy tom poezji roku. Czasopismo "Academy" wyróżniło go ponadto nagrodą.

W okresie tym Yeats poznał dwie kobiety, Maud Gonne i lady Augustę Gregory, które - każda w inny sposób - odegrały wielką rolę w jego życiu. Działaczka rewolucyjna i aktorka uchodząca za wielką piękność, Maud Gonne, złożyła jego rodzicom wizytę w 1899 roku. Zainteresowała ją poezja Yeatsa i zapragnęła poznać autora. Tak zaczęła się największa i najromantyczniejsza miłość poety, wierna i nieszczęśliwa. Kilkakrotnie się oświadczał, ale Maud nie zgodziła się zostać jego żoną. Wolała romans z francuskim dziennikarzem w Paryżu. Potem wyszła za mąż za rewolucjonistę irlandzkiego McBride'a, z którym pożycie okazało się udręką. Gdy po kilku latach rozwiodła się z nim, Yeats ponownie starał się skłonić ją do małżeństwa. I tym razem odmówiła. Może miała rację mówiąc, że świat będzie jej wdzięczny za tę odmowę. Nie tylko dlatego, że z goryczy odrzuconej miłości zrodziły się liczne wiersze Yeatsa, ale i dlatego, że nie potrafiłaby mu stworzyć spokojnego domu, jakiego potrzebował, by pisać. Oświadczyny jego odrzuciła również jej córka, Iseult.

Były w tym czasie i inne kobiety w jego życiu. Najbliższą z nich pozostała długo Oliwia Shakespear, ale odeszła z płaczem widząc - jak mówił w wierszu The Lover Mourns For the Loss of Love (Poeta opłakuje straconą miłość) - obraz innej w jego sercu.

Ożenił się dopiero w 1917 roku z Angielką, George Hyde-Lees, która wkrótce po ślubie zaczęła przejawiać skłonności mediumistyczne, może prawdziwe, może udawane. Ważne było, że przykuła tym zainteresowanie męża, co zapewniło im szczęśliwe pożycie, mimo że nigdy nie wygasła jego miłość do Maud Gonne.

Po ślubie Yeatsowie mieszkali przez kilka miesięcy w Oksfordzie. Yeats obawiał się, że jego rodacy będą niechętnie patrzyli na Angielkę. Gdy powrócili do Dublina, okazało się, że jego żona potrafi zjednać sobie sympatię wszystkich, i nigdy nie traktowano jej jak wroga.

Inaczej zaważyła na twórczości Yeatsa przyjaźń z lady Gregory. Bogata arystokratka po śmierci męża włączyła się w odrodzeniowy ruch swego kraju. Znalazł w niej Yeats niejako mecenasza sztuki. W jej pięknej posiadłości, Coole Park, do której często go zapraszała na dłuższe pobytu, miał znakomite warunki do pisania

poezji i nastrój prawdziwie romantyczny. Dzięki niej poznał lepiej wierzenia i pieśni ludowe. Wspominał ją po latach w swoich Autobiografiach (Autobiographies) jako "źródło spokoju, doradcy, który nigdy nie przeceniał i nigdy nie lekceważył kłopotów". Dwa zbiory jego wierszy, W siódmym lesie (1904) i Dzikie łabędzie w Coole (1919), nawiązują tytułami do źródła ich natchnień, lasów i jezior w posiadłości lady Gregory. Przyczyniła się ona najbardziej do powstania teatru irlandzkiego, do dziś istniejącego Abbey Theatre.

Prace organizacyjne i pisanie sztuk teatralnych pochłonęły Yeatsa na kilka lat, niewiele czasu pozostawiając na poezję. Jednakże zbiorowe wydanie jego wierszy w 1908 roku świadczyło już o dużym dorobku twórczym. Znacznie później, bo dopiero w 1925 roku, opublikowana rozprawa A Vision (Wizja) ukazała podłożę filozoficzne, a raczej metafizyczne jego poezji. Przedstawiony w niej ezoteryczny system zrodził się z dociekań okultystycznych, z wiary w kontakty z duchami, we wpływ gwiazd na życie ludzkie, w reinkarnację i w cykliczność historii. Z filozofią sensu stricto Wizja niewiele ma wspólnego i nie wiadomo, czy sam autor traktował swe wywody całkowicie poważnie. Istotne jest, że zafascynowany kabałą wykorzystał jej znaki w obrazowaniu swoich wierszy. I co jeszcze ważniejsze, zagłębianie się w magię utwierdza go w przekonaniu, że słowa mają siłę magiczną. Bliski jest romantykom angielskim wierzącym, że słowem można dotrzeć do absolutu i objawić go ludziom.

Z teoriami metafizycznymi łączy się ściśle doktryna maski, wyjaśniająca wiele zagadek w wierszach Yeatsa. Zakłada ona, że każdy człowiek pragnie posiadać cechy przeciwne wrodzonym i w tym celu przybiera maskę kogoś zupełnie od siebie różnego. W swoich esejach tłumaczy Yeats, że "szczęście zależy od energii, z jaką się przybiera maskę kogoś innego (...) wszelkie radosne lub twórcze życie jest ponownym rodzeniem się w formie różnej od samego siebie".

Wybuch pierwszej wojny światowej nie zmienił nic w życiu Yeatsa. Dopiero krwawo stłumione powstanie irlandzkie w 1915 roku stało się wstrząsem dla poety i punktem zwrotnym w jego twórczości. Znika z jego wierszy "celtycki półmrok", a wkracza bezlitosna rzeczywistość. Próbuje tę rzeczywistość odkryć i zrozumieć sens skazanych na klęskę walk. W czasie wojny zginął we Francji syn lady Gregory. Ta śmierć i ból bliskiej mu osoby sprawiły, że zaczął patrzeć na wojnę już nie tylko jako problem irlandzki, ale jak na sprawę ogólnoludzką. Wpłynęło to tym bardziej na oderwanie się od marzeń. Zajął się bardziej działalnością polityczną. Po utworzeniu Wolnego Państwa Irlandii Południowej w 1922 roku powołany został do parlamentu. Działalność jego koncentrowała się głównie na zagadnieniach kulturalnych. Domagał się zniesienia cenzury, wysunął projekt założenia akademii literatury i teatru narodowego. W tym samym roku uczestniczył w Kongresie Narodu

Irlandzkiego w Paryżu. W tym okresie bez większych zdarzeń, okresie względnie ustabilizowanego życia, powstały jego najlepsze utwory, zebrane następnie w dwóch tomach, Wieża (1928) oraz Kręte schody i inne wiersze (1933).

Tytułowa wieża to zabytkowa budowla w pobliżu posiadłości lady Gregory. Yeats wieżę tę odrestaurował w 1917 roku i przez pewien czas mieszkał w niej z rodziną. Zawsze marzył o posiadaniu zamku i życiu w stylu arystokratycznym. Thoor Ballylee częściowo te pragnienia zaspokoili. Stała się głównym symbolem w jego życiu i powojennych wierszach. Ucieleśniała dla niego przeszłość, wszystko, co w dawnych wiekach było wielkie i piękne. Meble z wiązu przypominały o kulturze ludowej. Na murze kazał wyryć napis głoszący, że wieżę tę zbudował dla żony i że roboty ślusarskie wykonano w miejscowej kuźni. Miała to być wieża całkowicie irlandzka. Znalazły w niej również wyraz eskapistyczne tendencje Yeatsa z młodych lat. Z dala od miast, stała samotna wśród irlandzkiej przyrody, w idealnym dla kontemplacji miejscu. Ale zajęcia wymagające obecności Yeatsa w Dublinie czy Londynie coraz mniej zostawały czasu na przebywanie w wieży. Lato 1929 było ostatnim, jakie w niej spędził. Budowla popadła w ruinę, nikt nie myślał już o jej restaurowaniu. Ale uwieczniła ją poezja Yeatsa.

W latach dwudziestych pogarszające się zdrowie poety powodowało częste jego wyjazdy za granicę, do krajów o cieplejszym klimacie, do Hiszpanii i na Riwierę. Przez dłuższy czas mieszkał w Rapallo we Włoszech.

Ciekawym epizodem był wyjazd z indyjskim mistykiem Shri Purohit Swamii na Majorkę. Uczył się od niego mądrości Wschodu. Przy jego pomocy zaczął przekład Upaniszad, ale postępująca choroba nie pozwoliła mu tej pracy ukończyć. Znowu musiał jechać na kurację do Francji. Lekarze zalecili alpejskie powietrze, więc zamieszkał z żoną w Cap Martin. Górskie powietrze nie przyniosło jednak poprawy zdrowia. Zmarł w styczniu 1939 roku we francuskim hotelu "Ideal Sejour". Po drugiej wojnie, w 1948 roku, przewieziono jego ciało do Irlandii, gdzie zgodnie z jego życzeniem pochowano go w Drumcliff.
